<p style="text-align: center;"><u>Iron Age Celtic Crafts</u></p> <p>The Celts were expert metalworkers. They made elaborate carvings with pictures of plants and animals on them. They decorated their helmets and shields and made beautiful jewellery, including torcs (neck rings) and bracelets. To this day Celtic patterns are known for their distinctive, swirling shapes. Design and make a torc, brooch, belt buckle. Use cardboard, pasta and other crafting materials.</p> <p>6 points</p>	<p style="text-align: center;"><u>Grow your own cropmark!</u></p> <p>One of the most fascinating ways of spotting archaeological sites is through recognising "cropmarks". Use cress seeds and gravel to grow your own cropmark as in the link</p> <p>https://www.yac-uk.org/activity/grow-your-own-cropmark</p> <p>6 points</p>	<p style="text-align: center;"><u>A Day in the Iron Age</u></p> <p>Create a comic strip to show a typical day in an Iron Age Hillfort. Think what an Iron Age man, woman or child might do-farming, building, crafting, feasting, and partaking in religious ceremonies.</p> <p>6 points</p>
<p style="text-align: center;"><u>Iron Age Tools</u></p> <p>Create a Venn Diagram of modern tools, Iron Age tools and tools that were created during the Iron Age but we still use today.</p> <p>6 points</p>	<p style="text-align: center;"><u>Celtic Language</u></p> <p>Some people today still speak languages that the Celts spoke, Welsh and Gaelic. Can you learn some words in the Celtic language?</p> <p>4 points</p>	<p style="text-align: center;"><u>Pre-historic Maths</u></p> <p>Use some leaves, sticks or stones to design a way to explain hundreds, tens and units to another child.</p> <p>4 points</p>
<p style="text-align: center;"><u>Iron Age Life</u></p> <p>Write a list of at least 5 questions that you would like to ask an Iron Age person.</p> <p>4 points</p>	<p style="text-align: center;"><u>Iron Age Hillforts</u></p> <p>There are many Iron Age hillforts in Dorset: Maiden Castle, Eggardon Hill, Lewesdon Hill...Research or visit a local Iron Age hillfort. Draw an illustration of the hillfort as it would have been in the Iron Age.</p> <p>4 points</p>	<p style="text-align: center;"><u>The Celts</u></p> <p>Imagine you are an archaeologist. Place small objects in sand, soil or rice and ask someone to find them using a small brush (Toothbrush/make up brush).
